## Principal's Column

Yesterday Jill and I attended the Hume-Moreland Principal's Network meeting. During the meeting there was a presentation from a school that had introduced School Wide Positive Behaviours (SWPB). You will know that this is an initiative that we have also introduced.

The North West Victorian Region are encouraging all schools in the region to consider taking on the SWPB initiative, so we are well ahead of the game in that we commenced implementation early last year.

One aspect of SWPB is the introduction of a positive acknowledgement or 'rewards' system to encourage children to do the right thing. The philosophy is that rewards will steadily fade after the expected behaviours become entrenched. We are working on this right now.

We will soon be organising a competition for students to design an illustration depicting our three school values – Respect, Resilience and Responsibility. Winning designs will be made into postcards that teachers will use to acknowledge children's positive behaviours. Postcards will be sent home to parents and families so that they too can support their children in their positive behaviours.

## Mother's Day



Mother's Day is a time of commemoration and celebration for Mum. It is a time of breakfast in bed, family gatherings, and crayon scribbled "I Love You"s.

The earliest Mother's Day celebrations can be traced back to the spring celebrations of ancient Greece in honor of Rhea, the Mother of the Gods. During the 1600's, England celebrated a day called "Mothering Sunday".

During this time many of England's poor worked as servants for the wealthy. As most jobs were located far from their homes, the servants would live at the

houses of their employers. On Mothering Sunday, the servants would have the day off and were encouraged to return home and spend the day with their mothers. A special cake, called the *mothering cake* was often bought along to provide a festive touch.

A long tradition and one well worth remembering.

## Student Attendance

**It is important for all students to be at school every day.** With Winter approaching, there will be many students who experience coughs, colds and other minor illnesses. When deciding whether to keep your child at home from school, please consider the following:

A child should be at school unless -

- the child is too sick to leave the house
- the child has an infectious disease like measles, chicken pox or mumps
- the child has an injury preventing movement around school
- a medical or dental appointment could not be made out of school hours.

Please remember **that if children miss the basics in the early years of schooling they often experience learning difficulties later on.** There is a direct link between attendance and achievement, and poor patterns of attendance in the early years can lead to poor patterns of attendance throughout the school years.

## NAPLAN

Our students in Grades 3 and 5 this week participated in NAPLAN testing.

NAPLAN is an annual national assessment program for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Students in these year levels participate in tests in Reading, Writing, Language Conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy.

Although NAPLAN determines students' 'point in time' academic achievement, it is important to remember that their scores will only reflect their skill and understanding on the day of the test.

As mentioned, the NAPLAN tests were conducted this week and individual students' reports will be issued later in the year.

## Attitudes to School Survey

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of our school. The Attitudes to School Survey has been in place for several years for Grades 5 and 6 students, but this year is open to Grade 4 for the first time.



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The survey is provided by the Department of Education and Training. It is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's experience at school.

All responses to the survey are anonymous. This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted *online* (again for the first time) during the period Monday, 22<sup>nd</sup> May to Friday, 23<sup>rd</sup> June. The survey only takes 20-30 minutes to complete and will occur during class time.

The survey results will be reported back to the school at the end of July. Please speak to your child's teacher if you would like further details.

## Drop Off Area

Several parents are entering the Drop Off Zone and stopping in the parking bay when dropping off their children. They then reverse or enter the flow of traffic in the Drop Off Zone.

This is a dangerous practice as children are often in the area, and we ask that all parents and families use the area as it was intended to be used, without disrupting the flow of cars through the zone.

**Please do not use the parking bay for picking up or dropping off children.**

The Victorian Premier's Reading Challenge is now open and Oak Park Primary School is excited to be participating.

The Challenge is open to all Victorian children from birth to Year 10 in recognition of the importance of reading for literacy development. It is not a competition; but a personal challenge for children to read a set number of books by 8 September 2017.

Children from Prep to Year 2 are encouraged to read or 'experience' 30 books with their parents and teachers. Children from Year 3 to Year 10 are challenged to read 15 books.

All children who meet the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement signed by the Victorian

Welcome to the 2017 Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge.

For over a decade, the Challenge has promoted the importance of reading among children and students, encouraging them and their families to read more widely and more often.

We know that reading is critical to the development of our kids. It's why the Challenge is so important. It helps children understand the world around them, developing their language skills and nurturing their imagination. Catering for all interests from birth to Year 10, the Challenge has more than 9,000 titles.

For children from birth to five, the challenge is for parents and carers to read 40 books with their child/children. For students from Prep to Year 2, the challenge is to read or experience 30 books and for students in Years 3 to 10, the challenge is to read 15 books.

Children who complete the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement. They will also have the opportunity to see their name on an online honour roll.



### TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Definitions: *Department* refers to the Victorian Department of Education and Training. *Person* refers to the child/adult listed below in the consent declaration.

#### 1) Privacy Protection

The Department takes its privacy obligations seriously and any personal information collected or used by the Department will be handled in accordance with the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014* (Vic). This law sets out what we must do when the Department collects, uses, handles and destroys personal information. Personal information includes personal details such as an individual's name and school that could be used to identify an individual.
