Principal's Column

How To Make Friends

One way to be happier is to increase the quality of our friendships. Whether you are a sociable person or a loner, friendships are important. One of the easiest ways to remain engaged and interested at school, at work or in life is to enjoy the company of the people that we are with.

Let's talk about how to build friendships (without turning into some sort of gushy, over the top, Ned Flanders type character).

Look people in the eye

Gaining brief eye contact with people communicates interest and trust. One simple way to do this is to mentally remind yourself to notice the colour of other people's eyes as you say hello to them.

Smile and say hello

While the minimalist "hi" accompanied by a shrug may seem cool, it can also come across as disinterested and uncaring. Smile genuinely when you meet people and let them know you are glad to see them.

Call people by their name - a lot

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Be where you are

One of the easy ways to stand out as a good friend is to be with people when you are with them. This means rather than checking messages, or scrolling through social media or sending texts you actually stop, talk, look at and listen to the people you are with.

Feel lucky to know them

Ask people what they think

One way of getting past the awkward stage in conversations is to ask people just what they have been doing but also what they think about something. Seeking their ideas and thoughts shows that you value them.

Get to know a lot of people

Not everyone you meet will be a close friend. The more people you get to know even a little bit, the more likely you will be able to find friends. It can also be good in life to know some people as good acquaintances as well as having close friends.

Get to know people who are different

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Parent/Teacher/Student Meetings

Staff members are very busy at present writing the June Reports for each student in their classes. This is a very complex duty and teachers try very hard to write full, fair and comprehensive reports within the guidelines and constraints of the school's reporting program.

As a written report cannot convey all the necessary information it is crucially important that parents and students attend the Parent/Teacher/Student Meeting Day on Wednesday June 26th (alternative times can be negotiated if you can't make this day).

This day is an 'alteration to school hours' day and students are marked present when they attend the Interview with their parents. Please note there will be no school for children on this day – except when they attend the Parent/Teacher/Student meeting.

Reports will be available online from **Friday June 21st** to give parents the opportunity to read them prior to the meetings

Booking Parent Teacher Interviews through Compass

On Wednesday 26th June, you will be provided with an opportunity to meet your child's teachers to discuss the mid semester report, learning portfolio and general progress. Time slots will be available between 9:00am and 7:30pm and interviews will be scheduled at 15-minute intervals.

To make a booking through the app, ensure you select the 'menu' (3 bars) in the top left-hand corner of the screen. Then select 'Conferences.' A new page will appear, titled 'Term 2, 2019 Parent Teacher Interviews'. Once you have selected it, your child's name will appear on the screen and you will then be prompted to select the teacher and class and then you will see a drop-down box with the available times. Select your preferred time and then you will be asked to 'Confirm Booking.'

Bookings close on Tuesday 25th June. Please ensure you book as soon as possible.

Specialist teachers will be available in the Library all day. We will not have a booking system in place for them. You can go to the library any time between 9:00am and 7:30pm to discuss your child's progress.



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Student Wellbeing - Aged Care Program

Words cannot express how proud I feel of our children from Oak Park PS. Group C, our first group of students to visit the aged care facility, displayed a great deal of compassion, empathy, leadership skills, respect for the elderly, responsibility and resilience throughout our visit. Initially, on arrival, it felt a little confronting for some students, especially for some who had never visited a family member in a nursing home before. Although all students quickly warmed to the residents and shared a photo of their family with them and a favourite book they'd selected. They also played the piano, were throwing and catching the ball and shooting the ball through a hoop - this got everyone involved and we even noticed a bit of competitiveness between our students and the residents.

I received a call directly after our visit to Hilltop Aged Care facility and was so pleased to hear that the aged care residents asked the employees when our students would be returning. They were extremely happy to have us and said that our children from OPPS are very polite and respectful - I agree!!!!

One lady called Eleni, who spoke mostly in Greek, wasn't able to express how much she enjoyed the student's company, due to having dementia. She apparently kept asking 'Pou ine ta pedia?' Which translated means 'Where are the children?'



It nearly brought me to tears to see the true happiness in the residents faces when around our students and also the sparkle in their eyes. At times, we experienced language barriers, some moodiness (which I had to explain further to our group) and no oral communication, but our amazing students found it within them to communicate with the residents and to put a smile on their faces!

NAIDOC week is about celebrating Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander peoples and recognising the great contribution of their culture to the Australian community.


Big Al, Pancakes and Azza hosted the day and took the students through a Welcome Ceremony where they introduced themselves and painted student faces in traditional tribal patterns. The students were then split into groups where they rotated through three different activities:

Aboriginal Art where they used symbols to tell a story, **Aboriginal Dance** where they told a story using specific aboriginal dances, and **Storytelling** where the students learnt about different Indigenous and Non - Indigenous tribes.

The day concluded with a Closing Ceremony where the girls performed the 'eagle arm dance' and the boys performed the 'emu dance'. There were rave reviews across the school from students to teachers, all enjoying a fabulous, engaging and very educational experience.

Thank you to the Indigenous Education Committee for working tirelessly together to make this opportunity a reality.

CERES – Student Environmental Leadership Program

On Monday 17th June we were visited by Tom, Claire and Leah from CERES Environmental Park. They worked with representatives from all 3-6 classrooms, plus our school captains to survey the school in terms of its biodiversity provisions.

The students worked through a whole day program learning about eco-systems, completing an audit of our school grounds, putting together an action plan and working on an insect hotel.



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The students were thoroughly engaged and contributed thoughtfully throughout the sessions.

Our next challenge is putting our plan into action and creating ways by which we can increase the range of living things that might find food, shelter or other comforts in our school grounds. This was also part of our commitment to Resource Smart Schools (through which we were able to have this experience free of charge) and was the final step in achieving our 'CORE' module, which we will now submit for accreditation.

Inquiry Learning

At Oak Park Primary School, Inquiry has shifted into a 'contemporary approach to inquiry:'

1. Inquiry learning has become an approach and is undertaken across the day rather than in the afternoon under the heading of Integrated Studies. Inquiry is a way of being for both teachers and students.
2. Inquiry learning has moved from topics to concepts that are explored through a big question rather than an idea.
3. Inquiry learning has moved beyond the classroom and connected students digitally to the world, Without leaving the classroom
4. Digital technologies that were once an optional extra are embedded in teaching practice.
5. Units of inquiry have moved from shared plans to shared, differentiated and personalized pathways. Units are planned collaboratively and there are some shared experiences and others that are customized to the students learning needs in the different classrooms in a year level.



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- Inquiry learning has moved from teacher initiated and planned inquiry to a co-constructed approach that gives students a voice and input. Initially the inquiry is framed with possible lines of inquiry and a couple of shared learning experiences. Teachers collect what the students know and are curious about. From the shared learning experiences the teachers bring the data back and look at what it tells them about where to go next. This process brings the students into designing learning experiences for themselves.
- Inquiry has moved the learning from a contrived/artificial context to work with real-world issues, opportunities, challenges and problems for authentic audiences and real-life benefits.
- Inquiry has moved from learning ABOUT to learning HOW. In Kath's words: Don't learn it – Do it – Then you learn it.
- Inquiry has moved students beyond reflection to reflection and metacognition (thinking about their thinking and learning).
- Inquiry has moved from teaching skills alone to teaching skills and dispositions or character traits.

Classrooms will be focusing on the concept of 'Discovery.' Ask your child what big questions they have around that concept and what they're curious about learning

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STEM Superstar Visit

This week, Grade 2 were lucky enough to get a visit from a real life scientist. Dr Kate Fox is a STEM Superstar who works for RMIT University **(she also plays footy with Martha!).**

She talked to the kids about how she uses 3D printing to make plates which doctors insert in people's bodies when they have broken bones.

Did you know that scientists are experimenting with using powdered diamonds in the plates to increase their strength?

One day, you could have diamonds inside your body! We also learnt that the strongest material in the world is spider silk and that a material named Kevlar is a synthetic spider silk that is strong enough to stop bullets.

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
